

GenAI-EduMap



The Tipping Point participates as a Partner in the three-year Erasmus+ project "**GenAI-EduMap**", which runs from April 2026 to March 2029. In Greece, the project is coordinated by the Athena Research Center, through the Institute for Language and Speech Processing (ILSP). The project brings together research and academic institutions, public education authorities, teacher training providers, and schools, with the aim of promoting the responsible and pedagogically grounded use of GenAI across European education systems. It is implemented in collaboration with the University of Cyprus, the Cyprus Pedagogical Institute, Trinity College Dublin/Learnovate, University College Dublin, Luleå University of Technology, the Institute of Educational Policy (IEP), Ellinogermaniki Agogi, the Swedish National Agency for Education, and The Tipping Point.

The project's objective is to map current practices in the use of GenAI across four European Union countries - Greece, Cyprus, Ireland, and Sweden - by identifying both innovative opportunities and emerging challenges. It will then pilot AI tools, pedagogical scenarios, and educational resources in real educational settings, implement pilot initiatives in schools, provide professional development for educators, and develop implementation guidelines and policy recommendations to support the responsible use of GenAI in education.

Within the project, The Tipping Point is responsible for designing and delivering professional development activities for educators, equipping them with the knowledge and skills needed to harness the potential of GenAI in a human-centred, inclusive, and responsible way, both for themselves and for their students.

The project's results will be openly available to the educational community, contributing to the development of a European framework for the responsible use of Generative Artificial Intelligence in education.

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
